The Rules

01	Exhibitors must live in The Lee Parish, Ballinger, Potter Row or South Heath, be a member of Ballinger Horticultural Society, have an allotment at Lee Common or Ballinger or have a child at Lee Common School. Children who are exhibiting must either live in these areas, or attend Lee Common School, or be a member of Lee Common Scout Group.
02	A visitor is any exhibitor other than one covered by rule 1 above.
03	An exhibitor may enter more than one exhibit in a class, but only one prize will be awarded.
04	Exhibits must be staged between 8:30 am and 10:30 am – ready for prompt judging.
05	In Division 1 produce is judged on quality, except for floral art classes, and must have been grown by the exhibitor. Please name variety of vegetables, fruit and pot plants if known.
06	In the classes 1 and 19 collections the same number of each kind must be shown as in separate classes e.g. four onions, four potatoes, three beetroot, five peas and two of any other vegetable. Judged according to RHS points.
07	The decision of the Judge is final.
08	Only officials of the Show are allowed in the marquee during the judging.
09	Any container can be used to display cut flowers/foliage in water. An annual is grown from seed this year.
10	Pot plants must be in the exhibitor's possession for a minimum of two months. Last date of purchase 16th May 2022.
11	In Division 3 – Handicrafts – please provide your own display materials and mounts and state on a label attached whether your own original design, a copy, or made from a kit. No previously exhibited work or anything made prior to July 2019.
12	Exhibitors' cards must be fixed to exhibits in classes 88-95.
13	Entries brought to the show after the judging has begun will be staged by the stewards at their discretion.
14	Exhibits must not be removed until after 5:00 pm.

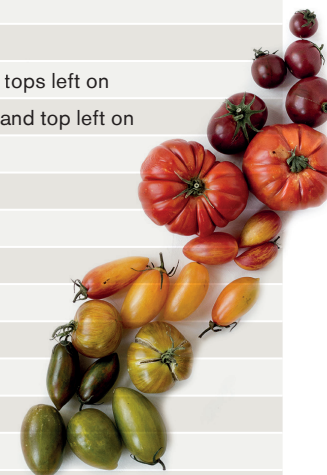

Grenada Spice Cake Recipe Class 75

Ingredients

250g soft brown sugar
225g soft butter
3 eggs
250g self-raising flour
1 tsp baking powder
2 tsp grated nutmeg
1 tsp ground cinnamon
½ tsp allspice
Pinch of salt
Grated zest of one lime
120ml milk

Method

Grease and base line a 23cm x 13cm (9" x 5") loaf tin
Pre-heat the oven to 180°C (160°C fan) or gas mark 4
Cream the butter and sugar until light and fluffy
Add the eggs and grated zest and beat well
Combine the dry ingredients and gradually add to the mixture together with the milk
Pour into the prepared tin and bake for 60 minutes until cooked when a skewer will come out clean
The mixture may appear to be too much for the tin but during cooking does not overflow
Cool in the tin for 15 minutes then put on a wire rack to cool completely
